The Boys from Syracuse, Rodgers & Hart

Rodgers & Hart's 1938 musical *The Boys from Syracuse* was the first Broadway musical based on a Shakespeare play, *The Comedy of Errors*. The characters and setting remain the same, but Rodgers' score frames the story in a thoroughly modern world of swing, blues and jazz.

Fiordiligi and Dorabella are heartbroken that their fiancés, Ferrando and Guglielmo, have been called off to war and must leave them. With the doctor Don Alfonso, the girls watch their ship sail out of port and hope that a gentle wind will keep them safe. (In reality, the men have placed a bet with one another concerning Fiordiligi and Dorabella's fidelity. Ferrando and Guglielmo will return disguised as two Albanian soldiers and try to seduce each other's fiancées.)

Iphigénie en Tauride, Gluck

Iphigénie dreamed that she was in Aulis, where her father offered her as a sacrifice to the gods 15 years before. She saw his palace destroyed by lightning and her father, stabbed and bleeding, fleeing the destruction. Her mother, Clytemnestra, handed her an axe and vanished. Iphigénie tried to run away, but her brother, Orestes, appeared. She reached for him but struck him with the axe instead. Terrified by her nightmare, Iphigénie begs the goddess Diana, who saved her from the sacrificial altar, for mercy and to let her die at last.

Act II Sextet

Don Giovanni, Mozart

Alone and afraid, Elvira waits for Leporello, disguised as Don Giovanni, to return. Leporello is tired of doing his master's dirty work, and is desperate to get away from the clingy Elvira. Meanwhile, Don Ottavio tries to comfort Donna Anna, who is traumatized by the murder of her father by Giovanni. Leporello tries to leave unnoticed, but Zerlina and Masetto see him and, believing he is Giovanni, expose him to the others. The two couples call for revenge against the lecherous Giovanni, but Elvira begs for his life. Threatened with death, Leporello removes his disguise. The characters, Leporello included, rage at how Giovanni has deceived, betrayed and used each of them for his own pleasure.

Marie Theres'...Hab' mir's gelobt

Der Rosenkavalier, Strauss

After a brief and passionate affair with the young page Octavian, the older Marschallin realizes that their love cannot last forever. In the final trial, she brings Octavian and the beautiful young Sophie together, singing. "I swore to love him and even to love his love for another," while Octavian and Sophie declare their love for each other.

Euch lüften...Entweihte Götter!

Lohengrin, Wagner

Christine Goerke, Jennifer Root, Gerard Michael D'Emilio

Exonerated of the murder of her brother and now engaged to the mysterious knight who defended her innocence, Elsa sings of her grief transformed to joy and love. Her accusers Ortrud and Telramund, now banished from the kingdom for their lies, overhear her. Ortrud calls to her and implores Elsa's pity: it is because of Elsa that she now lives in disgrace. Elsa sympathizes with Ortrud's plight and agrees to open the castle door for her. With her plan for vengeance set into motion, Ortrud invokes the powers of the pagan deities Wotan and Freia to aid her in the destruction of Elsa and her knight.
